## LIFE AND WORK, SEPTEMBER. SHAW'S ARTICLE: BUILDING ON CHRIST'S FOUNDATIONS.

'I'm not often lost for words. I am very seldom stunned into silence. However, sitting up front on a journey through Paris, while driving on the 'other' side of the road, gives the passenger the perspective of being in the driving seat without a steering wheel or, more importantly, a brake pedal. That was a journey that stunned me into silence and left me feeling like I had stepped off a theme park rollercoaster.

Perhaps my reaction to that journey says more about me as a passenger than anything else! The taxi driver in question got us through the city centre to the airport promptly and safely. However, in my defence, I was not the only one relieved when we arrived.

Life, as Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, can be described as being on a rollercoaster. Apart from a week in Argyll (my go-to place to switch off), my diary has been full, it has been fast-paced but, unlike that taxi journey, it has been exciting and thrilling. I have had some wonderful experiences and been part of events and occasions that will stay with me forever. However, the overwhelming privilege of my time thus far has been meeting so many wonderful people.

It has been refreshing to be out and about, visiting churches and communities all across the country. At a time when there is so much negativity around the church it is refreshing to encounter so much positivity. Individuals who give of their energies and expertise as an expression of faith, working together to serve Christ's Church, whether that be leading worship, supporting local schools, resourcing foodbanks, developing youth outreach, caring for others with memory issues – the list is endless.

It has been a joy to share in so many good news stories and to be reminded that despite the challenges that face us, the church is still reaching out in the Name of Jesus Christ. My plea is that we do not lose sight of all that we do in Christ's Name.... for whenever we do this for the least important, we do it for Christ (Matthew 25).

I would like to say thank you to all those whose contribution to the life and witness of the church often goes unnoticed and yet it is at the heart of the church's mission. I would also like to acknowledge the ways you have encouraged and inspired me. It has been a real blessing to witness the strength of faith and passion for the Gospel in the individuals who, together, are the church. This is without doubt the real privilege of being the Moderator.

During General Assembly week, I used a simple prayer as a reminder of the gifts with which we have been blessed, that we might use them to continue to build the church on Christ's foundations.

Let us pray together saying...

Lord God. Keep us true to who we are.

Enable us to use the gifts you have given.

Bless us with your Spirit that we might build

to be your church at work in the world.

## CHURCH MODERATOR MARKS THE START OF THE SEASON OF CREATION

Published on 1<sup>st</sup> September 2024

Rt. Rev. Dr. Shaw Paterson, the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, marks the start of the Season of Creation which begins today and will run until Friday 4 October. He writes:

I am not a poet! However, it was suggested that I might write a prayer or poem for the Season of Creation, and that got me thinking. As I began to write and play with words my attempt at a poem actually made me think more deeply about Creation and my place within it. I hope my musings will do the same for you as I offer this prayer/poem to aid you to reflect. Don't be afraid to correct, to take further or develop for if you do it will fulfil my intent. I hope and pray that you (and me) may be motivated to think more deeply during this Season of Creation.

#### Lord God,

We are part of Your Creation

We look around, we use and abuse We can see what we'll lose But now its time for us to choose

We are part of Your Creation

We moan and we complain We are quick to point the blame But everything just stays the same

We are part of Your Creation

We express our concern We now worry, not if but when But ... we never seem to learn

But what we do takes its toll We look around, what is our goal We are involved, we have a role

'A radical hope' by Dr Robin Knight, Research Officer with the Faith Action Programme of the Church of Scotland. (Life and Work, September 2024) – a summary

'We can all see that poverty is impacting the lives of many in Scotland and that churches are responding. Congregations across the country are running foodbanks, hosting practical support workshops and making a difference in a myriad of creative and compassionate ways. Community work like this has been inspired by what God tells is in the Book of Deuteronomy: 'I command you to be open handed.....there need be no poor people among you.'

The article continues that 70% of the children who live in poverty are in households where someone is in work. 'The relationships between the three main factors that influence poverty: earnings from employment, the cost of essentials such as housing and childcare, and income from social security, means that often people find themselves trapped in a cycle of poverty through no fault of their own.'

Emma Jackson, Convener of the Faith Action Programme's Public Life and Social Justice, reminds us that 'the overarching story of the bible, the fullness of the gospel and the very nature of God is flourishing and wholeness for all of us. Having enough is the foundation to build life from - it should be unconditional. Just like the radical, unconditional grace and love of Jesus poured out to us all through his death on the cross.'

The article continues: 'One solution is the Minimum Income Guarantee (MIG) which was adopted as policy by the 2024 General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. It's an approach which has at heart the concept that everyone should have enough to live on, no judgement, no conditionality.

'A MIG approach would mean reforms to the world of work, policies and investment to ensure fair work, reduced costs for essential services and flexible and fit for purpose benefit payments, to ensure that everyone has enough to live on. For most, reforms to work will ensure that paid work or other income will be sufficient income to meet the Minimum Income Guarantee - a minimum income floor that no-one would be able to fall below, that is ours by right. For others, an additional MIG payment would be targeted and tailored to meet different needs.'

As the economic costs of poverty, such as health care, are very high, commitment to MIG would ensure that some of the harm created by poverty could be averted, saving tax payers' money spent addressing the impacts of poverty.

**Next steps**: A Scottish Parliament Cross-party Working Group will produce a road map for implementation in the Autumn; the Church of Scotland is joining with other denominations and the Poverty Alliance at a conference on October 12 to explore how we as churches can contribute to the debate and act. 

We were in London recently and while we did have a day in the city centre – where we chanced upon St Columba's Church of Scotland – however, my favourite London activity is wandering wetlands and canals and watching wildlife.







I have been reading about Creation Time which ran between 1<sup>st</sup> September and 4<sup>th</sup> October and as you can imagine it's a time for celebrating and reconnecting with God's beautiful world .... notwithstanding the damage we have inflicted and inflict daily on that same beautiful world. I do find it strange boxing Creation into a month – but then we've done that with Advent/Christmas and Lent/ Easter although we know that Christ's birth, death on the cross and resurrection are with us always in everything we do. I think I am finding Creation difficult because I've realised that I align myself with Thomas Aquinas who saw God in all Creation, not a separate reality, not a separate person but in everything. God just as being. Which gives me a problem with 'Our Father, who art in Heaven!' So, having tied myself in knots, let me just say that I find it hard not to believe in God when simply looking around....gardens, fields, grasses waving in the breeze, a robin, sheep grazing ... while it's good to celebrate Creation, I simply cannot confine that celebration to a month but rather every time I step out of doors.

It is a beautiful world we have inherited and which we are charged with safeguarding for future generations. Let us never forget to thank God for his Creation and to do our utmost to limit any further damage to it, to repair damages already inflicted, to remember that those who suffer most from climate change are not those responsible for the damage.
