

LIFE AND WORK, OCTOBER: BUILDING ON CHRIST'S FOUNDATIONS.

We must always remember.

This month we remember and give thanks.

Remembrance calls us to pay respect to the brave men, women and children – living and dead – who have fought to preserve the nation. But in doing so we are compelled to count the cost of our heritage in terms of the lives lost and forever changed. Every November, we say 'thank you' to all those who have placed their lives in jeopardy for us, and to acknowledge and say thank you to their families whose lives have also been forever changed.

The Rev. George McLeod, the Govan minister who organised the rebuilding of the abbey on Iona, gave an account of a regimental boxing match during the Second World War. Between rounds, a soldier who had been wounded and had lost his memory entered the ring holding a large piece of cardboard carrying the question, "Can anyone tell me who I am?" Having lost his memory he had no identity. He had no name, no past, no roots, no history and little sense of himself. To have found a memory would have been to recover a person – not only a past but a present as well and a future.

It is right and proper that we respond to the call to remember each year; if we didn't we would lose our past, our roots, our history. Without the memories of our past, part of who we are would be missing. For many of my generation and younger, our minds are to a large extent

educated on historical events by the movies. There are some old favourites like The Great Escape, The Bridge over the River Kwai, The Dambusters, Sink the Bismarck, to name but a few... and there is an inherent problem. Many of the war films tells a tale with a bit of poetic licence and stretching of what actually happened. As the tale unfolds, the allies are victorious and in the main (admittedly with a few exceptions) they end with a sense of being victorious and they all lived happily ever after. Yet, for those who experienced war and conflict there could be, and can be, no 'and they all lived happily ever after', such was the effect of their experiences.

We must always remember. We owe it to those who suffered and died, and to those who suffered and lived – lived a life with the physical and mental consequences of what they endured. As we remember and pray for a day when nation shall not lift up a swarm against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore. This world of ours needs to learn from the past and it needs to learn to love one another.

They shall grow not old as they that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At their going down of the sun and in the morning

We will remember them.

LIFE AND WORK, NOVEMBER: 'HOORAY! IT IS HARVEST TIME'

There we are, hurtling along the road in our car on some imagined mission of huge national importance, racing against the clock to get somewhere; muttering at cyclists and other drivers who are inconsiderate enough to want a bit of our road (and hoping they can't lipread as we pass by), rounding a bend and coming up against a tractor and trailer. It is silage time. Over the next few miles, with no opportunity to overtake, we notice there is another tractor in front of the one in If front. But of course, after the silage is cut, the fields are often doused in slurry, which means our newly washed car is going to get covered with its own unique odour. And we are in a hurry.

Hooray. It is harvest time and that means more tractors. I am certain that most of us on such a car journey do not start singing songs of everlasting thanks and praise to our great God for the generous provision, or blessing the farmers for the work they do to put food on 🔀 our plates.

So here is our challenge for harvest and beyond. If we get stuck on

our travels behind a tractor or a combine or a trailer or any other mysteriously shaped implement that belongs in a field, take it as an opportunity for reflection, for thanksgiving and for praise. Why should we bother? Firstly, because praising God for our blessings should become a matter of habit in all of us. Second, because we owe 🔽 a huge debt of gratitude to the farmers who are taken for granted. Most of us have become emotionally and practically detached from the source of our food. Our food comes from the fridge.... but we know it doesn't really come from the fridge as we get it from the corner shop or supermarket. We cannot and must not take food provision as guaranteed. Speak to any farmer and we quickly learn of the issues of balancing production costs with sales figures. Climate change, population growth and world politics mean that it is becom-Ing more difficult to ensure there is enough for the world's needs. Hooray. It is harvest time but we need to appreciate the year-round activity that is required to produce a harvest. Then, when we are inconvenienced and find ourselves stuck behind a tractor, take a deep breath (as long as the slurry trailer is not attached) and smile, and ask for God's blessing on all those who work on the farm and who play a part in providing our food.

For those in rural or semi-rural parishes, if the worship leader arrives late for the service on a Sunday morning you now understand why! While waiting for the service to begin, use the time to offer thanksgiving prayers to God (no matter what time of year) for the seed-time and the harvest and for our life, our health and our food (to paraphrase We plough the Fields and Scatter). Happy harvest to you all.

'We are ordinary people doing extraordinary things' A report from the annual Gathering of the Church of Scotland Guild. (Life and Work, October)

If one word could sum up this year's annual Gathering of the Church of Scotland Guild it would be 'joyful', writes Lynne McNeil.

Malawian guests from the Livingstonia Synod CCAP, members of the Women's and Men's Guilds enlivened the proceedings with their singing, dancing and sparkling white uniforms.

Rae Lind, the outgoing National Convener, described the journey towards a new constitution and 'new ways of doing Guild'. She also reflected on her year in office and thanked the Guild for its trust and enthusiasm.

Communion was led by Shaw in his role as Moderator and he went on to address the Gathering developing his theme for the year 'Building Together'. He praised the Guild members for their work supporting not only their local parishes but also the whole church across the country and around the world. He encouraged the Guild to continue this work despite the challenges it faces. He was presented with the new 'Friend of the Guild' badge and also with a scarf in the Guild tartan as a gift for King Charles as Shaw was heading to Balmoral to preach in Crathie Kirk.

The four projects for the next few years were announced: Bibles for Bairns – Scottish Bible Society Build my Church – Bear Necessities for Bulgaria Operation Hope – Release International Playful Beginnings – Crossreach

There was also an update on LIFT (Love In Fellowship and Trust) a branch of the Guild for young people.

After some lively singing from the Malawian guests and Finley Morse and friends, Christina Paterson was installed as the new National Convener. She acknowledged there were challenges for the Guild but added that her hope for the year and the future could be summed up in 3 words: enthusiasm, encouragement and unity.

HARVEST THANKSGIVING

Many thanks to everyone who supported our Harvest appeal. Several car loads of Harvest donations have been donated to Glasgow Lodging House Mission (LHM), which prepares more than 45,000 hot meals every year for those who are homeless, vulnerable and socially excluded.

Our monetary donations this year amounted to £1300 and this has been a great help to LHM in terms of funding their work.

LODGING HOUSE MISSION

Last month I spent a day at the Lodging House Mission which is a Glasgow based charity dedicated to providing care and support to homeless, vulnerable and socially excluded people.

I was amazed at the variety of services on offer which are resourced by a committed and caring team of staff and volunteers.

In the evening, I was invited to speak at their annual Homelessness Service and hear about the growing demand on their resources. June, the centre manager, commented:

"This year, our food bills have more than doubled, and in some areas, they have even trebled. In addition, we are seeing more people walk through our doors than ever before. As a result, our resources are being used to the maximum, and we are continuously striving to meet the growing demand for our services. To give you some context, in 2022 we served a minimum of 25,055 [meals] which rose to a minimum of 32,688 in 2023. For 2024 we are already at 27,000 with 3 months to go so it is clear that last year's figure will be exceeded."

The LHM is grateful for all the support from churches - particularly at Harvest Time - as they care for others while sharing the love of Christ.
