We flew over early on Saturday, arriving in Paris mid morning. We were fortunate to be able to attend a very special one-man play, "Beyond The Chariots" in the church on Saturday afternoon. This play was about the life of Eric Liddell after the Olympics, about his life in China as a missionary, where he died in 1945 as a Japanese prisoner of war. It was a very moving and emotional play and thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Shaw & Christine attended this too, and after the play we had refreshments provided by the members of the church, we were made so very welcome.

The following morning we had a wonderful 40 minute walk from our hotel to the church, along past the Place de la Concorde and Champs Elysees where there were lots of preparations happening for the Olympics.

Again, we were given a very warm welcome from the members of SKP, and were also joined by Kirstin & Arran Kinniburgh who were on holiday nearby. The service was wonderful, very uplifting and Shaw did a fabulous sermon from the very same lectern that Eric Liddell had used 100 years ago.

At the end of the service a 5 year old boy from the congregation led us all in singing "The Lord Bless Thee and keep Thee", all so very special. This was followed by Shaw unveiling a plaque to mark the occasion, then we were all invited upstairs to join the members in a lovely lunch.

What a fabulous 36 hours in Paris, just so special and we feel very privileged to have been able to be present.

A once in a lifetime opportunity and we are both so glad that we were able to be there.

August: **Stepping out in faith**: In his first column, the Rt Rev Dr Shaw Paterson writes about why the Church needs to be at work in the world in moving forward.

Picture the scene less than 24 hours earlier I had encouraged commissioners to the General Assembly to go back to their parishes and communities and build together the church of Jesus Christ. In that message, I shared with them an annoyance I have when travelling.... when others step off an escalator and stop to take stock of where they are going next: left, right or straight ahead. They do so completely unaware of the resultant pile-up of people behind who cannot, as a result, get off the escalator. My message was that we all need to step out, step forward, in the confidence that the Holy Spirit is with us.

Well, as Christine and I were making our way back to Strathaven with four heavy cases between us we struggled to the train station to discover the escalator wasn't working. There was a large queue for the lift and so it was a tortuous trip down a flight of stairs. I couldn't help but smile as I would much rather have a pile up at the bottom of an escalator than the aches and pains of using the stairs.

Jesus calls us to follow him. At times we may not have a clear idea of where we are going, or (to use the illustration above) where we will step off the escalator, but he will be with us on the journey. God will help us use our talents, our gifts, and our abilities to make a difference in other people's lives. In the short time I have been travelling around the country preaching, meeting, sharing, I have been amazed to witness the incredible force for good that the church offers in the communities it serves. Even with all the changes and challenges, the church has not stopped but has continued to step out and step forward. I am already seeing for myself how congregations in so many different ways make a positive contribution to those around them. It is wonderful to see the Gospel of Jesus Christ at work with so many buildings together to share God's love and the Good News of Jesus Christ. I am seeing scripture in action: (for) '*I tell you, whenever you id this for one of the least important of these members of my family, you did it for me!*'

While it's always good to take stock of where we are, we must not stop. Every single one of us has to think of how we care for others, of how we fulfil that great commandment to love our neighbours. Yes, preaching is an integral part of ministry and it is great that so many of our congregations now have worship leaders and that we have moved beyond it being the minister's job. For we are all ministers. But we also need to get out of the pulpits and the pews of a Sunday morning and be the church at work in the world... we need to continuously review the needs in our parishes, the issues that people are living with and respond. We need to keep moving forward.

What I have already witnessed in these early months of my tenure fills me with encouragement, for I see the evidence of Christ's work everywhere.





LIVE STREAMING

Our Strathaven services are livestreamed (and available as a recording later). It is only the chancel area and first two pews that are in sight of the camera. Parents, in particular, should be aware that if they do not wish their child to be visible 'on-line' then they should ensure that that they sit a couple of pews from the front.
